#### CDE QUALITY ASSURANCE PROGRAM OVERVIEW



Purpose: Ensures LEAs comply with IDEA requirements for equitable education Legal Framework:

- 1. Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)
- 2. California Education Code
- 3. Federal regulations on disproportionality (34 CFR §300.646-647)

#### Significant Disproportionality Process:

- 4. Annual risk ratio calculations by demographic groups
- 5. Identification of LEAs exceeding threshold for 3 consecutive years
- Mandatory implementation of Comprehensive Coordinated Early Intervening Services (CCEIS)
- 7. Reservation of 15% of IDEA Part B funds for CCEIS activities

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**



RSD has been found to be disproportionate in regards to the identification of Hispanic students in the area of Specific Learning Disability since 2016-2017.

Because of the number of consecutive years of disproportionality the CDE has identified Rosernead School District "Significantly Disproportionate" in this area.

Since then, RSD has been designing, implementing, and monitoring annual action plans to address this disproportionality.

- Stakeholder Group participation in amending plan
- \* Budget (\$84,141)
- Set aside of 15% of Special Education federal funding
- Progress monitoring

#### Measurable Outcome:

By December 2026, following training around best first instruction including Tier 1 and Tier 2 supports as indicated in the English Learner Master Plan, Rosemead School District will demonstrate consistent implementation of established tiered supports which are implemented with fidelity across the district through the SST process (inclusive of PreSST document in Beyond SST) prior to a referral for Special Education evaluation as measured by increased student achievement on districtwide interim assessments, curriculum-based assessments (in alignment with designated i-Ready growth targets in Encinita and Savannah Single Plans for Student Achievement and RSD LCAP.

#### Target Student Population:

Students in grades 1-3 at Encinita Elementary School and Savannah Elementary School whose relative placement on the i-Ready reading diagnostic assessment is at least 1 grade level below their current grade level in reading will be included in the target group.

#### Activities:

- 1.1 Continued collection of qualitative data by conducting empathy interviews with Hispanic students/families
- 1.2 Designate literacy lead teachers at targeted grade levels to develop and train staff in implementation of Tier 1 and Tier 2 supports
- 1.3 Implement intervention tools to support provision of tiered intervention instruction
- 1.4 Provide monthly PD during late start meetings for teachers of targeted students in the area of first best instruction, including understanding cultural differences and linguistic needs of students.
- 1.5 Train teachers to effectively and equitably implement designated intervention tools including progress monitoring and analysis of student achievement data by subgroup





#### **REWARDS Program**

Specialized program for adolescent students in grades 4–12 who struggle reading long, multisyllable words and comprehending content-area text.

#### The 7 Habits

SSA continues the focus with The Leader in Me program, which empowers students with leadership and life skills. It creates a positive school culture where every child takes ownership of their own learning.



#### Extended School Year (ESY)



The ESY program includes specialized academic instruction and related services provided to students with disabilities beyond the regular school year to help maintain critical skills and prevent regression.

#### Key Points:

- ESY is not summer school it is an extension of the current school year and is individualized based on a student's IEP.
- · Services are provided at no cost to families.
- Eligibility is determined annually by the IEP team.

#### Who Participates?

A student is eligible for Extended School Year (ESY) services if their IEP team determines that they need special education and related services beyond the regular school year to maintain their progress and prevent significant regression. This determination is based on a case-by-case analysis of the student's individual needs, considering factors like regression, recoupment, and the potential impact of a break in services.

#### **Newcomer Classes**

Newcomer Classes provide extra academic support in English Language Development as well as math, science and Leader in Me. Classes will provide interactive instruction in small class settings.

#### Dual Language Immersion (DLI) Classes

Students enrolled in DLI classes during the school year have a wonderful opportunity to build on their Mandarin language skills. The program supports both oral and written fluency, helping students grow in confidence and communication. 
